Independent Auditor's Report

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets — modified cash basis of Project Sweet Peas as of December 31, 2019, and the related statement of revenue, expenses, and changes in net assets — modified cash basis, cash flows — modified cash basis, and functional expenses for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statement.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Notes to Financial Statement December 31, 2019

1. OPERATIONS AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Operations

Project Sweet Peas (the "Organization") is a national non-profit organization that offers programs and services that support the well-being of families who have an infant in intensive care and of those who have experienced pregnancy and infant loss.

Basis of Accounting

The Organization prepares its financial statement on a modified cash basis that includes rental deposit and deferred income and expense for fundraising related to future activities. Under this basis, revenues are generally recognized when collected, rather than when earned, and expenditures are generally recognized when paid, rather than when incurred.

Classes of Net Assets

The financial statement reports amounts by class of net assets.

Net assets without donor restrictions are currently available for operating purposes under the direction of the Board, designated by the Board for specific use, donor-advised funds, or invested in property and equipment.

Net assets with donor restrictions are stipulated by donors for specific operating purposes or for the acquisition of property and equipment or are time restricted. These include donor restrictions requiring the net assets be held in perpetuity or for a specified term with investment return available for operations.

Inventory

The inventory includes items that are used mostly for care packages and there are supplies used for events. The inventory is calculated at average price or the fair value of donations.

2. DONATED INVENTORY

In-kind donations of inventory used by the Organization are valued at the estimated fair value at the time of the donation. In-kind donations of inventory totaled \$32,651 for the year ended December 31, 2019.

3. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

4. INCOME TAX STATUS

The Organization's activities are generally exempt from federal and state income taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

For the year December 31, 2019, management of the Organization is not aware of any material uncertain tax positions to be accounted in the financial statements.

All tax-exempt entities are subject to review and audit by federal, state, and other applicable agencies. Such agencies may review the taxability of unrelated business income, or the qualification of the tax-exempt entity under the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state statutes. With few exceptions, the Organization is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years before 2016.

5. LEASE

The Organization leases space under an operating lease that, at the option of the tenant, may renew for five additional successive one-year terms from October 31, 2018, at a monthly rate negotiated annually. Rent expense for the year ended December 31, 2019 was \$7,200.

6. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through May 28, 2020, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, for events requiring recording or disclosure in the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2019.

7. NET ASSETS WITH DONOR RESTRICTIONS

Donor-restricted net assets are available for the following purposes:
